# Report from Ian Loftus President of the Vascular Society



The proposed NICE guidelines regarding aortic aneurysm repair have been the focus of much attention. The publication date has been delayed again, creating further uncertainty and anxiety. A revised date for publication has not been set, but stakeholders including the VSGBI have been advised that this is to develop a plan of implementation.

The VSGBI Council has repeatedly raised concerns about the guidelines, and are unanimous in our approach. We will continue to do so in collaboration with other stakeholders, including BSIR.

We have a meeting of the Joint Vascular Programme Board at the end of July. We will again raise our concerns about the implications of the guidelines for patient safety and outcomes, vascular services, training and workforce retention.

On a positive note, myself, President-Elect Chris Imray, and Vice President-Elect Mike Jenkins recently had a very fruitful and positive meeting with the current and incumbent Presidents of BSIR, Trevor Cleveland and Ian McCafferty. A joint statement will be issued shortly, and we will be meeting on a regular basis going forward. We aim to ensure collaboration on all areas of mutual interest, including the provision of services, training and audit.

The theme of the ASM in November, in Manchester, will be 'a safe and sustainable vascular service'. The NICE guidelines will be very pertinent to this, as will our important Quality Improvement Programme for lower limb ischaemia. It's a crucial time for the Society and for vascular surgery as a speciality. We hope as many of you will join us in Manchester for what proves to be a fascinating and thought provoking meeting.

Critical limb threatening ischaemia is the focus of much attention. PAD-QIF Early Implementation Centres.

We are interested to hear from centres who would like to be involved in the early adoption and implementation of the PAD-QIF. It is envisaged that 6 to 10 centres will be chosen to come together and discuss current patient pathways and share ideas and good practice to improve timelines to limb-salvage and patient outcomes.

The RCS England QI Team has agreed to support a day at the College to facilitate discussions and the dissemination of good practice. The date for this has just been confirmed as Thursday 17<sup>th</sup> October 2019 at RCS in London.

I am pleased to report that we have agreement in principle for an external validation of the NVR by a team from Vascunet. We are therefore looking for volunteer centres to be visited by a team from Vascunet, who will spend a couple of days cross checking NVR data with hospital systems. It is envisaged that this will take place in the Autumn 2019 and Spring 2020 and will involve about 8 centres.

### Special Interest Groups Chairs

As part of its national research strategy the Vascular Society aims to establish 9 Special Interest Groups (SIGs) in the following areas: Amputation; Aorta; Carotid; Diabetic Foot; Peripheral Arterial Disease; Vascular Access; Venous, Wound Management, Service Organisation, Access & Delivery.

We wish to appoint 9 SIG Chairs & deputy Chairs

a) to support a national Priority Setting Partnership (PSP) with the James Lind Alliance (JLA) to help oversee the development of research priorities for the vascular specialty

b) to develop a portfolio of sub-speciality studies to address these research priorities.

It is envisaged that each of the 9 SIGs will have representation from vascular surgery, trainees, patients, and other appropriate affiliated groups.


## (ASPIRE 6)
